



#### **Talent Development**


- Dedicate funding for community colleges to develop workforce training and technical programs in partnership with employers in high-demand fields and purchase equipment for emerging industries.

### MCCA Community College Compromise Proposal

- A tuition-free path for recent high school graduates who enroll full-time at a community college in which they qualify for in-district tuition or a tribal college.
- Students not eligible for in-district tuition may receive a **last dollar award** amount capped at the amount of in-district tuition and fees. Students not eligible for in-district tuition are students who may live in a community college district but choose to pursue a program offered at a different community college or students who do not reside in any community college district. This aligns with how Michigan Reconnect is administered.
- All students eligible for the MAS and who qualify for a federal Pell Grant will qualify for an additional payment of \$2,000 to help cover costs of attendance, as defined in the House proposal. Providing extra support to students demonstrating a significant financial need will help to ensure they have necessary resources to persist and complete their postsecondary goal whether it be a certificate, associate degree, or transfer to a university.

# FY25 Budget Update


#### **Community College Guarantee (Final)**

Beginning in fall 2024, students from the class of 2023 and beyond are eligible for the Community College Guarantee, a component of the Michigan Achievement Scholarship, which includes:

- Earning a skill certificate or degree **tuition-free** at their local community college (Scholarships are valued at up to in-district tuition, contact hours, and mandatory fees.)
- A \$1,000 Michigan Achievement Bonus award for Pell-eligible students, which can be used toward additional college costs.
- Same eligibility requirements:
  - Complete the FAFSA.
  - Be a Michigan resident since July 1 of the previous calendar year.
  - Graduate from high school in Michigan with a diploma or a certificate of completion or have achieved a high school equivalency certificate in 2023 or after.
  - Enroll full-time in college within 15 months of high school graduation.
    - Class of 2023 spring graduates: Must enroll by fall semester 2024.
    - Class of 2024 spring graduates: Must enroll by fall semester 2025.
    - Students who graduated at a different time of year and are concerned about initiating in time should contact their college's financial aid office.

Students choosing the community college pathway **do not need to meet the Student Aid Index criteria** previously established for the Michigan Achievement Scholarship – that means there are no income requirements to be considered for the Community College Guarantee. Students must meet SAI criteria if they are enrolled in a bachelor's program at a community or tribal college.

#### Executive Reorganization

Every Michigander deserves a path to prosperity. They deserve to explore, learn, grow, and develop the skills they need to thrive. That's why I am focused on building a bright future for Michigan by making strategic decisions and investments now for the long-term.

For too long, Michigan has fallen behind other states and countries when it comes to student achievement and attainment, impacting the state's workforce and economic growth. We know that today, more than ever, building a skilled workforce is not a matter of a single certificate, course, or credential. It's a generational project that will require a shared vision, effective decision-making, and strategic resource allocation to ensure that each and every person has the best opportunity to thrive.

In other words—we must support lifelong education, achievement, and potential.

Consolidating various programs from across state government into a single department will
enhance our ability to create a path to prosperity for every Michigander and support the
long-term economic health of our state with a coordinated strategy.

Establishing the Michigan Department of Lifelong Education, Advancement, and Potential, or MilLEAP, ensures all available resources, data, and dollars are aligned around a single vision—building an education system from preschool through postseoondary that can support our kids, families, and the economy of the future by ensuring anyone can make it in Michigan. MilLEAP will achieve this goal by establishing clear metrics, collaborating with cross-sector leaders at the local regional, and state level, and developing a shared action

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- Established via Executive Order in December
- Dr. Beverly hired as its first permanent director
- Administer grants to MI Community Colleges
- Priorities education from Preschool through Post Secondary with a focus on:
  - Early Education: Ensure all students are ready for kindergarten by providing access to childcare and preschool
  - Education Partnerships: Build partnerships that enhance K-12 education including access to after school and summer learning opportunities
  - Higher Education: Ensure every Michigander earns a certificate or degree to achieve Sixty by 30 goal
- Key Higher Education Functions
  - Administer all student financial aid programs including the Community College Guarantee and Michigan Reconnect
  - Provide grants to our colleges to improve success rates


#### **MCCA Statement**

## Michigan Corrections Officer Grant Program

Michigan's community colleges are offering 15 tuition-free credit hours to the state's corrections officers.



# Open Meetings Act

#### House Bill 5686 (Rep. Wendzel)

- Allows community college boards to meet remotely if the following occur:
  - 1. The board has passed a resolution that permits its members to meet remotely;
  - 2. At least a quorum attends the meeting in person in a location open to the public; and
  - 3. In addition to the 2-way communication required; members participating remotely, when speaking or voting, are visible to other members of the board and public who are attending the meeting in person or remotely.
- Referred to the House Committee on Ethics and Oversight
